

Beginners Guide to Pantomime

Pantomime is always based on a traditional children's story (Snow White, Cinderella, Aladdin etc) and is usually performed around Christmas/January time.

The "dame" is almost always played by a man in drag and is always a larger than life character. Quite often people of the opposite sex play other main characters.

There is usually a lot of risqué double entendre, often wringing innuendo out of perfectly innocent phrases. This is, in theory, over the heads of the children in the audience.

Characters will interact with the audience all through the pantomime. A response is ALWAYS required! This will include all of the following:

- When the baddy appears, you must boo him - LOUDLY. Even before he speaks! And especially when he is rude to you...

- If a character says "Oh no I'm not!" you respond with "Oh yes you are!" And to "Oh yes it is!" you respond "Oh no it's not!" etc etc.

- If someone is sneaking about behind the characters on stage you shout "He/she's BEHIND you!" They will usually pretend not to hear you so you have to shout louder until they notice the person behind them.

- If a character asks you a question such as "You knew that, didn't you boys and girls?" you must answer - loudly.

- You must sympathise with any characters that are feeling sorry for themselves

- The chorus (or extras) often appear in multiple scenes (but as different characters) and perform a variety of songs and dances throughout the show.

- Singing along with the sings you know is a MUST! There will be an audience participation song and there may well be a "sing off" between different parts of the audience, led by characters on stage.

- There is always a happy ending with the baddy getting his/her comeuppance.

Friends of Dorothy

So where did this phrase come from and what does it mean? The phrase refers to gay men and it's believed to date back to World War II when it was illegal to be gay in the US. Asking someone if they were a 'friend of Dorothy' was a way of covertly asking if they were gay. In the UK the phrase 'friend of Mrs. King' was also used.

Friends of Dorothy or FOD became frequently used on cruise ships to advertise a social gathering for gays and lesbians. The admission to being a friend of Dorothy was a quick easy way to tell someone you were gay in an age where gay bars were clandestine.

Over the years, Judy Garland has become a gay icon, particularly for her role in the Wizard of Oz as the ever optimistic and wistful Dorothy.
